- Educational NGO, New Delhi
- Participant observation, interviews with students and facilitators, interventions, exploration of 'wider context'
- Seeking to explore the impact of socio-economic background on perceptions of English in India








Context - Peter

- 8 month ethnographic study of (English) language in education policy, in municipality of Rionegro, Colombia.
- I'm exploring the social transformations are enabled through this policy...
- ...by thinking about this policy an infrastructure of 'modernity'.







- Informal interviews
- Material traces







Why We Chose Ethnography...

Peter

- Interest in day-to-day practices
- Uncover logics, discourses, practices - meaning making
- Ethnography as MORE than a method - orientation to research object

Katy

- Micro AS macro
- "Bricolage"
- Allows us to notice differences in reported vs actual practice (see e.g. Blommaert and Jie 2010)
- Language as a local practice (Pennycook 2010)

What was the challenge


- What counts as data / am I doing (enough)?
- Waves of data

Challenge - Ethics + Consent



What was the challenge

- Consent
 - Unexpected consent issues
 - Public office consent
 - Protecting participants
 - Limits of express consent sign / verbal
 - friends / taxi

How we found solutions

- How you tell the story
- Ethics as an ongoing practice (which continues to completion of thesis & beyond)
- Practical solutions (taking advice from one another!)

Challenge - Positionality

What was the challenge

- Friends with research benefits
- Teacher > researcher
- 'Native speakers'
- Coloniality, whiteness

- Being aware
- Engaging out of the classroom
- Choice of language

Practical Tips

- Transcribe immediately
- Have two recording devices

- Prepare for the unprepared (especially in India and Colombia)
