Programme details

The aim of this course is to explore some of the leading ideas of Dante's work and their continuing significance to us. The audience will be introduced to a wide range of texts and topics with a view to reconstructing the moral and intellectual world in which Dante lived. These topics will include Dante's approach to love, philosophy, theology, language, literature, politics, mysticism, astrology, as well as his understanding of nature, grace and the afterlife, his sources and his relevance to contemporary existential concerns.

The course is held in partnership with the Warburg Institute and University College London. There will be an introductory session in October 2017 followed by twelve more sessions from January to June 2018 covering the topics specified above. Scheduled to take place on Tuesdays from 7.00 to 8.30 pm, the course will be presented by Alessandro Scafi and John Took.
